## **Aims and Purposes**

St Christopher's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent, the Reverend Andy March, promoting in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of the church building of St Christopher's, Allesley Park and Whoberley, with its integral church hall, kitchen, and meeting room complex.

## **Objectives and Activities**



St Christopher's Church is situated at the very heart of our community, in Allesley Park and Whoberley, next to a community school, opposite shops and businesses and we want this to be reflected in the way we are as a church; we aim to provide a warm welcome for everyone in our community, from the very oldest to the youngest, so that everyone may be able to become part of this church family.

The PCC maintains an overview of the worshipping life of our church. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and taking communion together.

#### **Worship and Prayer**

2023 was the first year that felt normal after the disruption of the COVID pandemic and we have been blessed by our worshipping life together.

The PCC is keen to offer a range of services during the week and over the course of the year that our community find both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling. Our main **Sunday morning 10am service** is informal in its style of worship, attracts a wide range of ages, with children and families being an integral part of our life together.





We have **All Age Worship** on the first Sunday of the month; the other Sundays are Morning Celebration (twice a month) and Holy Communion (once a month). We have a creche and children's groups for all services, apart from All Age Worship.



We have also enjoyed returning to our occasional **Cafe Church** services for special occasions, such as Advent Sunday and Mothering Sunday.

One of the features of our church are the flower arrangements that make the church look so beautiful throughout the year and particularly at Christmas and Easter time. We'd like to thank our talented team, led by Sylvia Cliff: Diane Harrisson, Pauline Blunt and Kay Law. We would appreciate donations towards the cost of these arrangements.

Our weekly <u>Wednesday morning I I am Holy Communion service</u> provides an important space for more traditional, reflective worship, with the formal liturgy and hymns being a vital part of this and meets the needs of the older members of our church community. We're very grateful to Tom Borras who sets up for the

services, David Summers who plays the piano or organ for our hymns, and Sylvia Cliff and Pauline Blunt who have led non-communion services.

#### **Teaching Themes**

We aim for our preaching to equip people to live out their faith in everyday life. With this in mind during 2023 our preaching covered themes such as – The Sermon on the Mount; The Creed; Any Questions; Isaiah – Promised One. In the autumn we our All Age Services focused on the five marks of mission. From December we began to follow the Church of England Lectionary, which we will do throughout 2024.

#### **Electoral Roll and Attendance**

All are welcome to attend our regular services. At present there are 85 on the Church Electoral Roll, 28 of whom are not resident within the parish. 5 names were added during the year and I was removed either through death or because they moved away from the parish. The average weekly attendance, counted during October, was 65 - including 46 adults and 19 children on Sundays plus I2 at our Midweek Holy Communion service. An additional 6 people would join us online. Once again, our Christmas Eve All Age service was attended by a total of I30 people, which was one of the largest congregations of the year.

In addition to our weekly services, we hold a monthly evening service, Pursuit, which is more informal with a longer time of worship and the opportunity to pray for one another. This was attended by an average of 15 in 2023.

Our average weekly in person attendance for the whole of 2023 was a total of 68 (14 children and 54 adults), which compares to 64 in 2022 (12 children and 52 adults).

We also regularly joined in a monthly prayer meeting with Allesley Park Evangelical Church (APEC), which has been attended by an average of 7 from our church.

## **Quiet Waters: An Invitation** to meet **God** in stillness

In March 2023, we launched a new expression of worship - Quiet Waters.

Is your peace disturbed by busyness, stress and anxiety? How can you restore peace and



reconnect with God's presence? We invite you to join us to explore God's presence through meditation, contemplation and mindfulness.

We meet in church at 7.30pm on the first and third Mondays of each month. We are so grateful to Andy Houston and Stan Aldridge for developing the vision for and careful steering of this area of our worship, which is attended by around 15 people each time.

#### **Life Groups**

Life Group is the name we give to those small groups that meet during the week, as a regular part of the life of St. Christopher's. We believe that **following Jesus happens best when we're in community.** And, that **community is best fostered in smaller groups**, where people of all ages, stages and walks of life can become friends, have fun and grow. So, for those who want to become more part of the family at St. Christopher's, joining a small group is a great way to do it.

We call small groups at St. Christopher's 'Life Groups' because we want them to be about:

- sharing <u>life</u> with one another;
- finding <u>life</u> in its fulness (as Jesus spoke about, see John 10.10); and
- being 'thrust out into the <u>life</u>-stream of the world' (to quote John V.
   Taylor), in other words to get involved, together, in the life of the communities we live our lives in.

Life Groups are, therefore, about **welcome**, **nurture** and **reaching out** to others. We aim to have three types: groups for those who want to follow a course of **STUDY** together, for those who want to share in an **ACTIVITY** together, and groups for those who just want to be **COMMUNITY** together.

During 2023 three life groups met regularly and they embraced the themes of Study, Activity and Community. Two groups, Puzzling Times and Together at 2 are reported in detail elsewhere in this report. The third group, the Tuesday evening life group, focused on fellowship, nurture, worship and prayer and met in person and sometimes online. Thanks to Susan and Tom Borras and Sandra and Stan Aldridge who led this group. It's so encouraging that the three life groups involve about 40 of our church members.

#### **Our work with Children & Youth**



#### **Children & Youth on Sundays**

We want our children and youth to feel a full part of our Church family and so we look to make them central to everything we do. We design our Sunday mornings around helping them to connect to God.

We run three age-specific groups: Pathfinders, for those in secondary school, Explorers for those in primary, and Scramblers for preschoolers. At least once a month we make our main Sunday service an All Age gathering. In Pathfinders a highlight has been doing Youth Alpha together, which has led to some

fantastic conversations and a wonderful time of praying for each other as part of the Youth Alpha Holy Spirit Day.

#### St Chris Youth / Youth Cell

St Chris Youth - for young people aged II-18 – met every Sunday evening during term time, from 7:15-8:45 pm, in the church hall until the end of July; and due to the loss of a couple of members and changing team, started to meet as Youth Cell in the vicarage for a more in-depth time of discipleship. During the Autumn term we started watching first series of The Chosen together, and had great times of discussion, Bible study and prayer afterwards.

Thanks to our team - Cara Greenway, Andy March, and Ann McCabe, and Steph, who led St Chris Youth until the autumn. Would you like to join the team who can lead this fantastic group of young people?

## **Loving each other**

Welcoming, accepting and caring for one another - We are a loving and caring family where everyone can belong.



Our church family is a body made up of many parts. That's the way it's supposed to be. At St. Christopher's we are big fans of what Archbishop Rowan Williams has to say: that the church is God's pilot project for a new humanity. The way we come together, walk together, live together can show the world a redefined family, a new way of life. One part of that is that we look to welcome, accept and care for each other.

#### Regular expressions of family

We know that there are people in our community who could become lonely and isolated. We want to have a constantly open invitation to them to be part of the sense of family there is at St. Christopher's; and we are delighted about the opportunity to do this through our regular groups: **Together at 2**, the **Puzzling Times** jigsaw puzzle group; and our **Church Fellowship**.

#### Together at 2

"Together at 11" became "Together at 2" early in 2023, when a group of people made enquiries about using the Church Hall regularly for meetings on a Thursday morning. "Together at 11" agreed to move to 2.00 p.m. temporarily while negotiations were carried out.

When plans for the new group fell through, "Together at 2" held a ballot of all its members, when it was decided by a good majority that we would prefer to keep meeting at 2.00 p.m. This has worked out well, particularly during the Spring and Summer months, during which we have been on several outings for tea and cakes

in the afternoon. We started out by going to the Village Cafe in Berkswell, where we booked the inner room for ourselves, and had a delightful afternoon. After that we got enthusiastic and went a little further afield. Favourites were Melbicks Garden Centre, Coleshill, Oak Farm, Balsall Common, The Lavender Farm, Bubbenhall and The Charterhouse, London Road, Coventry. We hope to start our outings again as soon as the weather warms up.



When meeting in the Church Hall, we start with coffee, tea and cakes at 2.00 p.m., followed by entertainment. We have held quizzes, played Bingo and used Table Talk (where we pick a subject at random and everyone is invited to express their opinion). We have had two very much enjoyed visits from Chris Ford, who played the keyboard for us and invited us to sing-a-long.

Chris played music from the shows, and just before Christmas he entertained us with popular Christmas songs.

Our membership is still growing rather slowly (we average around 16) and we would be delighted to welcome new people, especially from the wider community. Thanks go to Sylvia Cliff and Nat Patterson, who choose the cakes and make the tea and coffee, Rosemary Lavens who keeps the Accounts, and Ian Lavens who is the best washer-upper ever.

We mustn't forget Tom Borras, who sorts out the tables for us before and after each meeting, We couldn't manage without him.

#### **Church Fellowship**

Another year has gone by! Members of the Church Fellowship have enjoyed eleven sociable meetings between February and December, with up to twenty members in attendance.

We were able to share food and have some friendly rivalry on quiz nights. Easter and Christmas were opportunities for us to share in Holy Communion and Carols in church, followed of course by hot cross buns and mince pies respectively. Our March get-together found us having a 'Film night' when we were educated about the life of a German missionary and evangelist, George Muller, who was responsible for setting up a number of orphanages and Christian schools in Bristol that housed and educated thousands of children.

We had visits from three guest speakers. In July, Simon from Warwickshire Wildlife Trust at Brandon Marsh came to tell us how we could make our gardens more friendly for the ever-dwindling numbers of hedgehogs.

In August we received a return visit from Barry James of the Midland Air Museum who told us about the history of the museum and their current projects, supported by many volunteers across all age ranges.

In November, Helen Barlow from the Dog's Trust told us about the Rehoming Centre at Honiley where up to 180 dogs are cared for at any one time, and the extra pressures put on their services since lockdown.

It is becoming harder to find organisations who don't charge large amounts of money to supply a speaker as we only have a small pot of money to use. This is one reason why it has been decided to increase the subscription for this year, to help cover increasing costs.

The small committee will endeavour to keep the Fellowship alive, and would welcome new members and offers of assistance.

We also have a bit of a 'swap shop' with puzzles completed at home brought to the group and then often passed on for someone else to complete.

Members of the group have been very generous with their time by washing up and also providing delicious treats, sometimes home made, to accompany our drinks.



We have donated some funds to Church to help with heating and lighting as we are grateful to have the use of warm comfortable surroundings each week.

The time spent in other people's company has been particularly valued by those who live on their own and new friendships continue to grow.

We are looking forward to another year of Puzzling Times.

#### **Christopher Robin Playgroup**

- A massive thank you to Caroline and the rest of the team who took on the running of the group when Liz stepped back from co-ordinating the group last year. Liz is now involved with running the group again.
- Our team of regular volunteers is currently Liz, Caroline, Mark, Cara, Diane, Tina B and Ann. Their commitment and enthusiasm is wonderful and allows us not to just do the practical jobs but spend time caring for people.

#### **Church Hall**

We want our church building to be available to our community as much as possible, and for it to be a space where all feel welcome and at home. This was the



reason for the extensive refurbishment of the church hall in 2019. Currently, 9 community groups regularly use the hall from Drama Tots and Jujitsu, to Jigsaw, Zumba and Tea Dance groups. The church hall was also used for 36 parties in the year, and there were 8 one-off bookings. There is scope for more regular users, which would be a benefit to the community and to us financially, as Hall Hire provides a much-needed income.

Various minor repairs have been carried out during the year, including the hinges to the inner front door that were failing to close properly. There are still several 'opportunities' that we will hopefully be able to address in 2024, including sealing the hall floor to make it more resilient, and energy saving lighting.

A new signage display has been installed in the hall. This displays changing images of events and attractions at the church, for both churchgoers and anyone renting the hall for parties or other private events.

A defibrillator was kindly donated to the church, which we have installed on the outside of the hall in a position that is always publicly accessible. There is only one other defibrillator on the estate that is publicly accessible 24/7 (at the golf pavilion in the park), so this new addition will provide a more readily accessible, potentially lifesaving service for the local community.

Thanks to Jo and Garry Cooke for the hard work they put in as caretakers and cleaners of the church hall, and for sorting access for community users of the hall.

Rental from hall hire brings in a significant income to our church - £16,772 in 2023 compared to £15,014 in 2022. This compares to £21,805 in 2018 and £18,380 in 2019 - the last full years not affected by the COVID pandemic. We would love to see the hall used even more by the wider community and are aware that in order to maximise the revenue we receive from hall rental, it needs to be as attractive a space as possible. We would like to form a small team to address this. Please speak to Andy if you're interested in helping.

#### **Building Development Plans**

Our church building has been a tremendous blessing to us and the wider community – it has been a venue for many gatherings of families and community groups over the years. But we have long held a desire for it to be even more of a blessing, This was the reason for the hall refurbishment in 2019, which itself was part of a phased project of building improvement, which we hope will culminate in the building of a new entrance foyer. At the end of the year we commissioned architects to draw some visualisations of what could be an incredibly welcoming space for the community, comprising a new entrance foyer improving access to the whole church building and café area, giving a new seating area where people can gather, relax and grab a coffee.







#### Can you help?

#### **Schools**

St John's Church of England Academy is our church school. Headteacher, Mrs Laura Stevenson, writes.



"St John's Church of England Academy are proud of the strong links we have with St Christopher's Church. Whether through sharing collective worship, the creation of faith-based extra-curricular opportunities for children or spiritual guidance for staff, the established relationship with the church enables us to offer the best experiences for our children. Our vision, 'I Will Shine' comes from Matthew's Gospel chapter 5 verse 16, which says, 'In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.' The vision was created to inspire and guide all children to be proud of their own uniqueness and understand the impact that their lives can have on the people and the world around them. Linked with our vision are six Christian values which teach

us how to be the best we can be: Drive, Character, Teamwork, Stewardship, Identity and Excellence. All of these are linked to passages from the Bible and were carefully chosen to inspire and guide our school community as we work together in our journeys of faith and learning. We are proud to be an International Cross of Nails School (ICONS) and St John's was presented with our own Cross of Nails in a ceremony at Coventry Cathedral in March 2023. The recognition of St John's as an ICONS school was due to the way we teach peace and reconciliation, both within school and encouraging children to have a positive impact on their community and the world beyond. We will always work hard to show care, love and respect to ourselves and those around us."



As part of his role as Vicar of St Christopher's Church, Andy March serves as an Ex-Officio Foundation Governor at St John's Church of England Academy, our church school. Andy's role has mainly focused on seeking to be a support to the headteacher and staff, meeting monthly with the headteacher, as well as leading worship for the whole school community through assemblies once a month and hosting the school at Harvest, Christmas and Easter.





Andy also welcomes class visits to the church and supports the RE provision, coming in for occasional lessons. Andy Clasper has also supported the school with RE lessons, assemblies and school services. Members of the church attend the school and support it in a number of ways – including through the new weekly "World Changers" after school club – more on that below!

On the 15th and 16th June 2023, 9,000 children, teachers and church leaders attended ALIVE 2023, a massive praise party organised by the Coventry Diocesan Board of Education, Imagine Ministries and Feed the Hungry.

Taking place at the NAEC, Stoneleigh Park, ALIVE 2023 comprised four worship concerts and two mass picnics over the two days! Key Stage 2 children from the family of 76 Church of England primary schools in the Diocese of Coventry were treated to live performances from a variety of contributors. ...

Together, the DBE, Imagine Ministries and Feed the Hungry recruited over 100 staff, contractors and volunteers to help ensure the day was a success. Many volunteers were local clergy and church members.

#### April Gold, Coventry Diocesan Director of Education says:

Many of our children attend very small schools, and the Covid pandemic meant that their experience of worship had been quite 2 dimensional on a screen! I wanted them to experience what it was like to worship God with thousands of others, to create a memory to take with them in life.

As a DBE we are passionate about local schools partnering with their parish Churches to inspire the next generation to become Kingdom Imagineers. ALIVE 2023 challenged children of all faiths and none to be emboldened and work together to challenge the adults around them to dream big and change the world.

Shell Perris, Director of Imagine Ministries and ALIVE 2023 Event Manager, Host and Performer says:

ALIVE 2023 was, by far, the biggest gathering of children praising God I have ever seen! Children, teachers and church leaders were fully engaged with every aspect of the event — the music, the dancing, the teaching, times of personal reflection and prayer, the picnic — and they were all having so much fun. It just goes to show that the church of Jesus Christ is very much ALIVE and children are leading the way! ...!

The Right Reverend Dr Christopher Cocksworth, Bishop of Coventry, says:

The Church of England's vision for education is that children and young people will have 'life in all its fulness'. ALIVE 2023 gave thousands of children a chance to sing and dance, listen, laugh and learn, to be loud and to be silent, and discover the fulness of life that comes from being world changers — people who have caught the vision of the sort of world of peace, kindness and justice that Jesus saw, and who decide to work with God for a better world for all.



#### **Uniformed Groups**

Our uniformed groups for have joined us for Parade Services at Palm Sunday and Harvest. These groups are also attended and supported by members of our church community and PCC.

#### **Supporting Good Causes**

Another key way we serve our community is through financial giving, either through hosting fundraisers or giving money from the church. In 2023, as well as supporting the **Love Christmas** appeal (see above), we supported **Coventry City Mission** through

their Giving Tree campaign, providing unwrapped new gifts for children; held a special offering for the **Syrian Orthodox Christian School** in Bethlehem and gave donations to **Hope Coventry**.

#### Youth Cafe



#### A space for teenagers to meet.

- Youth café runs on Tuesdays in term time between 3:30 and 5:15.
- This year we have seen 32 young people join us for sessions.
- On an average week between 10 and 15 young people join us for chat, craft, games, pool and table tennis.
- Teenagers in school years 7-9 are invited to just drop in.
- The initiative was set up originally in partnership with Youth for Christ, we really valued the input of Steph Pring who helped us to get started.
- Since October the team has decided to run Youth Café internally and delighted that we can pay Cara Greenway to be a regular team member and build relationships with the young people.
- Since September a thought for the day slot has been added to the sessions, these times help us care for the young people pastorally and to share the good news of Christ.

## **Financial Review**

Total receipts on unrestricted funds were £72,632 of which £44,210 was unrestricted voluntary donations, and a further £8,490 was from Gift Aid. Income of £4,933 was also received and is detailed in the Financial Statements. We were blessed by these donations which, in light of the increased use of on-line streaming services, allowed us to further update our audio/visual facilities to improve the congregation's experience. In addition, the return to a full Christmas Fair made over £2.000.

The planned giving, through Parish Giving Scheme, envelopes and standing orders decreased by 11%. Total income, including tax recovered was down by 13% compared with last year.

£50,000 was spent from unrestricted funds to provide the Christian ministry from St. Christopher's Church, comprising our Parish Share contribution, the same as last year and largely provides the stipends and housing for the clergy. The sum that the churches in the deanery have to find is shared between the churches, and worked out annually by a deanery meeting of clergy and treasurers. It is expected that churches who have a full-time clergy would contribute the full cost of this, which last year was calculated as £62,040. Due to the fall in income during 2023, we have proposed a reduction in our Parish Share contribution to £45,000 for 2024.

Through diligent control of our expenditure throughout the year, we reduced our unrestricted expenditure by 15.5%. However, the net result for the year was an excess of payments over receipts of £4,041 on unrestricted funds. Adding bank and deposit balances brought forward at the beginning of the year, the balances carried forward at 31st December on unrestricted funds totalled £5,207.

#### **Reserves Policy**

It is PCC policy to try to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds equating to between 6 and 8 weeks of unrestricted payments - equivalent to between £8,847 and £11,796.

It is held to smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet emergencies. The balance of £5,207 held in unrestricted funds at the year-end falls significantly below the range defined by our reserves policy. It is the PCC's hope to increase this over time, as and when income from planned giving and hall income recovers.

# Structure, Governance Management & Team

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. At St. Christopher's Church the membership of the PCC consists of the incumbent (our vicar), churchwardens, our curate, and members elected by those members of the congregation who are on the electoral roll of the church. All those who attend our services / members of the congregation are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent.

The full PCC met six times during the year. From July these meetings were divided into those meetings focusing on Strategic Governance (finance and buildings, etc), and those focusing on Mission and Ministry (children's work, life groups, outreach, etc. with an emphasis on our vision areas). This was born from the desire to make our meetings as effective as possible.

#### **Administrative information**

St. Christopher's Church is situated in Allesley Park and Whoberley, Coventry. It is part of the Diocese of Coventry within the Church of England. The correspondence address is 173 Winsford Avenue, Coventry CV5 9NJ. The PCC is a body corporate (PCC Powers Measure 1956, Church Representation Rules 2006) and a registered charity with the Charity Commission.

#### **Deanery Synod**

St Christopher's Church is part of Coventry South deanery, formed of 11 parishes. Three members of the PCC sit on the deanery synod. This provides the PCC with an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the church. See Appendix Five for the deanery synod report, which details the discussions that took place in Deanery Synod meetings since February 2023.

### **Appendix One - Vicar's Report**

I hope you've had the chance to look at our annual report. As you'll see, there's so much going on in the life of our church; so much for us to celebrate. I won't go over everything that's mentioned there, because it'd take too long, but I do want to highlight some things especially for those who haven't had the chance to read it yet.

Firstly, I want to express my gratitude to God and to everyone for the flourishing of this church community in the past year – week by week there is a sense of the Spirit at work within us as we worship and learn from God's word. So many of you contribute in various ways to make this happen – from the worship band diligently and skilfully led by Emma and James who work so hard to equip others to grow as musicians and worshippers; to those who lead our prayers of intercessions with sensitivity and wisdom; those who read the Word of God out loud and bring it to life; those who serve to give our children and young people the best experience possible on a Sunday morning; those who serve in the kitchen; the flower arrangers who beautify this space so skilfully; those who keep the place clean and tidy; our budding team of preachers; the list could go on. I look forward so much to our Sunday gatherings knowing that we are giving our best to serve the Lord and enable people to worship him. I've also been hugely encouraged by the way our congregation has grown especially in the past few months. To be a congregation of all ages spread fairly evenly across the generations, to regularly have over 15 children in church on a Sunday, to be a church with a good mixture of men and women worshipping together - none of this should be taken for granted. It demonstrates that we are a healthy church – and I've loved the fact that we're a multinational church too – it's wonderful to have people from as far apart as Hong Kong and Brazil as part of our family. There is something beautiful about this - and it gives us a taste of heaven. In Revelation 7, St John is given a vision:

I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice:

"Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb.",

We're not a great multitude, but more of this vision is happening – especially now that our church building is being used for worship by a Tamil speaking Pentecostal congregation – to hear them worship on a Sunday afternoon is wonderful – and one of the ways that we see the declaration on our foundation stone being fulfilled – this will be a house of prayer for all nations.

Outside of Sunday worship it has been good to witness the recent relaunch of our social team, headed up by Margaret Knipe and Tina Barnett. We had a lovely bread and soup lunch in March and next weekend we look forward to the Auction of Promises, which should be a wonderful evening – and more events through the year. Although those head up the team, many more work to make these things happen, faithfully serving behind the scenes.

Through the week we offer support and fellowship through our daytime groups like Together at 2 and the Jigsaw Puzzle group; and Life Groups enable us to grow in faith and fellowship. This isn't just for those who are part of the church – all are welcome. We provide this space for young people in Youth Café. Again, Christopher Robin continues to be an area of strength in our outreach, being a lifeline for so many mums who find support and strength from us and from each other – and they join in worship through Tots Church. Wonderfully, we've begun to see some families coming to church on Sunday having experienced a welcome through Christopher Robin first.

Our Christmas Fair again brought in a significant number of people from the wider community, and Community Christmas initiative demonstrated the love of Jesus in a practical way to some of the most vulnerable and struggling people in the parish at Christmas time; over 40 people were blessed in this way.

Our relationship with our church school, St John's School has grown from strength to strength. I myself spend a significant amount of time with the school, through delivering assemblies, lessons, and supporting the headteacher. Since September, following the Alive event at Stoneleigh we have had the wonderful World Changers after school club, which is basically church for them – and it's wonderful to lead this with Ann and Cara, and Tina in the autumn term.

As you know, I will be on sabbatical over the late Spring and early Summer. My focus during this time will be on Jesus – seeking to return to my first love, learning from him and encountering him and I will spend time in Scripture and in worship, using the Gospels for my inspiration. I'll be using a wonderful tool, "A Blended Harmony of the Gospels", which weaves the four Gospels into one chronological narrative. This has been divided into 40 daily readings. I'll work through them over the summer, reading and writing and worshipping in response to this.

But, I'd like this to be something we do together as a church – a journey we go on together, even if I'm apart from you over this time. I'd like to invite you to buy your own copy of the Blended Harmony of the Gospels – you can buy it on kindle, or there are paperback versions available in church for £15 – and then over the summer, I'd like to invite you to take that 40 day journey with Jesus. Then, when

we go on our weekend away together at the end of September, as well as experiencing teaching from Graham Archer, I will share some of what I've sensed God teaching me, and we will give space to share with each other. This could be fruitful for the whole church family. Together we can recapture our first love for Jesus, the Saviour and redeemer of the world – and as we do so, I honestly believe that it could have a transformative impact not only on us but on our community. I look forward to discovering what God has in store for us in the future as we continue to be a family on a mission, loving the people God has called us to serve here.

Looking back on this past year, I can genuinely see that we are a community living out our vision of being "God's family; loving like Jesus". I want to pay tribute to you all who play your part in making this such a special community to be part of — all of you who were named in the annual report. I want to pay special tribute to Stuart as church warden and Tom, who does so much behind the scenes — thank you; to Graham who is stepping down as church treasurer after a decade of faithful service — we would have been in a tremendous pickle without you; to my colleagues — Andy, who has been a wonderful curate in the past couple of years, and a friend too — we will miss you a great deal; and finally, Ann, who has been such a gift since your arrival as our ordinand in September.

The final thanks, of course, goes to God, the source of our life and hope -

"Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade."

### **Appendix Three – Safeguarding Report**

The Diocese of Coventry is committed to the safeguarding, care and nurture of everyone within our church community.

We believe that making our churches safe for all is everyone's responsibility. (taken from the Coventry Diocese safeguarding website) 2024.

The safeguarding officer has worked on embedding the safer recruitment & peoples management (SRPM) that was implemented last year. Moving through the coming year they will ensuring that volunteers get supervision that is laid down in the SRPM.

The safeguarding officer will also continue to ensure DBS checks and training are up to date for the volunteers within Church.

There has been a focus this year, from the Church of England on domestic violence and volunteers and PCC have been asked to complete an awareness from the Church of England training course.

Currently St. Christopher's has 18 volunteers that are required to have a DBS check and complete safeguarding training. We also have 3 people going through the recruitment process.

If there is anyone that would like to read about safeguarding and the role the church plays both for Children and Vulnerable adults then please talk to me or go to the Coventry diocese website, read more or undertake the training! It is informative. You may not be involved in volunteering but safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. It is not just the responsibility of those in volunteer roles. ### **Appendix Five - Planned Giving Update**

Last May, we held our 2023 St. Christopher's Giving Sunday. We were delighted with the excellent response. In November, however, a number of circumstances meant that we needed to ask for even greater generosity and so we issued a second appeal; and, again, the response was most encouraging. Our PCC has now signed off our year-end accounts and I am delighted to say that we were able to meet all our financial commitments. We want to thank you for your amazing support.

I am so incredibly grateful for all the ways the St. Christopher's family gives support: to each other, to our activities, and to the community of Allesley Park. Financial support to the church has always been both faithful and generous, and both our May Giving Sunday and our follow-up appeal in November were in keeping. As the table shows, our November appeal led to one-off gifts of £2317 and regular giving commitments which will be worth £1440 in the year ahead. In total, with Gift Aid, this will provide £4500 for our work over the 12 months from the appeal date.
